#### 6.1 Funds Available

1 To inform the Local Arts Scheme Subcommittee of the funds available for distribution.

#### **Assessment of Significance**

While the provision of funding for community groups is important, this matter is not deemed significant under the Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.

#### Discussion

- 3 Creative New Zealand allocates approximately \$43,380.00 GST exclusive annually in six month instalments to the Timaru District Council.
- 4 All funding applications to the Creative Communities Scheme Timaru District are considered by the Local Arts Scheme Subcommittee.
- 5 The Subcommittee meets four times each financial year. This is the fourth meeting for the financial year.
- The Timaru District Council is contracted to Creative New Zealand to distribute funds under the Creative Communities Scheme Guidelines. Council's Local Arts Scheme Subcommittee follows the Guidelines and allocates funds accordingly.

#### **Unallocated Funds**

At the end of June each year any unallocated funds in excess of 15% of the annual allocation from Creative New Zealand may be required to be paid back to Creative New Zealand.

#### Conclusion

8 Funds available as at 2 June 2022:

\$35,738.51 GST exclusive

The total funding available at 1 July 2021 was \$56,400.67, which included carry-over funds of \$13,020.67. Funding of \$17,400.00 was allocated in the September round, leaving \$39,000.67.

Creative NZ provided the Timaru District Council with a "CCS Delta Top-up 2021/2022" to the amount of \$12,719.24. This adjusted the funds available to \$51,719.91.

Funding of \$4,000.00 was allocated in the December round, leaving \$47,719.91 available for allocation over the remaining two meetings.

Funding of \$11,981.40 was allocated in the March 2022 round, leaving \$35,738.51 available for allocation at this meeting, which is the last funding round of the 2021/22 financial year.

#### 6.1 Transition to Online Application Process

#### Recommendation

That the information be received and noted.

Purpose of Report1 To inform the Local Arts Scheme Subcommittee that the Timaru District Council will move its grants application process online to a web-based grants administration system (SmartyGrants).

#### **Assessment of Significance**

2 This matter is deemed to be of low significance under the Council's Significance and Engagement Policy as this has ongoing but limited community interest and affects a small number of people in the community.

#### **Background**

- 3 The current system for processing funding applications is paper-based. This comes with risks and challenges as it is heavily manual. It is also an inefficient process that is cumbersome both to the customers and to the officers receiving and processing applications.
- 4 After a review of the current system, The Director User Experience and Community Engagement approached the Funding Manager and Funding Administrator with a proposal to move to SmartyGrants, a web-based grants administration system.

#### **Discussion**

- 5 SmartyGrants is a user-friendly application process for both the applicant and the administrator. It is a popular online platform for councils and grant administrators because it streamlines the application process, reducing manual handling, stores all current and previous applications (including drafts), and enables online accountability submission. Both customers and administrators can access, view, assess, approve and decline applications via a single online portal.
- The portal is secure, low-risk and supports a transition to lower reliance on paper-based systems. Recent discussions with other Timaru District grant administrators confirm that many funding providers are currently using or transitioning to SmartyGrants and express strong satisfaction with the platform. Using SmartyGrants will promote consistency across the district.
- Other Aotearoa New Zealand funders, specifically throughout the Canterbury region, use SmartyGrants to administer their funding, including Community Trust Mid and South Canterbury, Public Trust, Hamilton City Council, Auckland Council, and Tauranga City Council.
- 8 Customers who use the SmartyGrants platform for other grant applications, can access all of their applications through the SmartyGrants web portal, irrespective of the funder, and view

- who they'd submitted applications to via the same platform. This makes the programme more user-friendly and customer-centric. The more funders who use the SmartyGrants platform, the more enhanced the customer experience.
- 9 Smarty Grants will be rolled out across all grants the Council administers. The funds included are the Council Community Fund, the Youth Entertainment Fund, the Creative Communities Fund, and the Thomas Hobson Trust Fund.
- The transition will be widely communicated to all current and previous applicants, and promoted via the TDC website and social media. Partner agencies such as Venture Timaru, and other community funding agencies will also be notified of the transition.
- 11 The next Creative Communities funding round will have transitioned to SmartyGrants, but due to the tight turn-around time, the current paper-based system will still be allowed. All funding rounds thereafter will use only SmartyGrants.

#### Discussion

- The Subcommittee meets four times each financial year. This is the first meeting for the 2022/2023 financial year.
- The Timaru District Council is contracted annually to Creative New Zealand to distribute funds under the Creative Communities Scheme Guidelines. Council's Local Arts Scheme Subcommittee follows the Guidelines and allocates funds accordingly.

#### **Unallocated Funds**

- At the end of June each year any unallocated funds in excess of 15% of the annual allocation from Creative New Zealand may be required to be paid back to Creative New Zealand. Creative Communities New Zealand advised that any unallocated funds for the 2021/2022 year were not required to be paid back to Creative New Zealand.
- As at 30 June 2022, the funds available were \$23,499.99. These are to be carried over for the 2022/2023 year.

#### **Background**

- 9 It has been a busy year for the Creative Communities funding returns. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, there have been a significantly larger percentage of funds being returned as events are cancelled or down-sized due to various COVID-19 guidelines.
- The funds provided by Creative Communities New Zealand are provided in two six-monthly instalments. The first instalment of \$21,690.00 was provided on 18 August 2022.

#### Conclusion

11 Funds available as at 7 September 2022:

\$40,597.87 (excl. GST)

The total funding available at the beginning of the financial year at 1 July 2022 is \$40,597.87. This includes carry-over funds of \$23,499.99 from the 2021/2022 funding period as noted in paragraph 8.
