Ranui Avenue Speed cushion upgrade

We're upgrading the existing asphalt speed cushions on Ranui Avenue to rubber ones.

These will provide for more effective speed management along Ranui Ave, making it safer for people walking, biking and driving. The existing speed cushions are ageing and no longer fit for purpose.

Works will commence on 5 September 2022, with an anticipated duration of 1.5 weeks (weather dependent).

During works a road closure will be put in place along Ranui Ave and Jonas Street, to the Grasmere Street intersection.

Access will still be available for residents of Ranui Ave and buses.

Caroline Bay Sound Shell Seating Replacement Contract September Update

The Caroline Bay Sound Shell Replacement Project is progressing and looking amazing. There have been several hold ups with the inclement weather and the contractor is working hard to catch up on the lost time. Any changes to the completion date should be known in the next four weeks. Ground works have started for the last section and the crane will be back next week to install more panels.

2022/23 Resurfacing Programme Commencing September

The Land Transport Unit's resurfacing programme will be kicking off this month, and will continue over spring and summer. You'll see our road maintenance crews working all over the District, with well over 100 urban and rural roads scheduled for resurfacing.

What's resurfacing?

Resurfacing is like giving your house a new coat of paint - it protects the road structure from moisture, and helps it to last longer.

How are streets prioritised for resurfacing?

We have over 1,700km of roads in our District, and limited funding to maintain them. We consider safety risks, the volume of traffic, types of vehicles that use the road and many other factors when deciding which roads to prioritise for resurfacing. This helps us maximise the life of roads on our network and ensure we get the best value for money for our rate-payers.

Which roads will be resurfaced this season?

If your street is being resurfaced you should be part of a letterbox-drop prior to work being undertaken.

WE NEED TO TALK ABOUT... NATURAL HAZARDS



Timaru District is undisputedly a beautiful place to live. It's hills, mountains, coastline, rivers and expansive plains make for a rich environment where we can thrive.

With this beauty comes inherent risks due to the natural hazards associated with the district's geology and location. River flooding, overland flows (routes that stormwater follows to the flood plains during heavy storm events), coastal erosion and inundation, slope instability, earthquakes, liquefaction and tsunamis are identified to varying degrees as risks in our district.

These natural hazards are addressed in Part 2 - District Wide Matters of the District Plan - He Po He Ao Ka Awatea and are found under the Hazards and Risk chapter and the Coastal Environment chapter.

A National Policy Statement mandates that anything pertaining to the coastal environment must be included in the coastal environment chapter, which is why coastal erosion and inundation are included here.

These chapters set out the policy and rules for managing activity that will best protect people, property and our critical infrastructure from the worst effects of the identified natural hazards. However, even with the best planning, there are times where damage and loss of property simply cannot be avoided.

Data, scientific research and modelling underpin the decisions shaping the policy and rules for these chapters. For example through new research by Environment Canterbury (ECAN) after the Christchurch earthquakes liquefaction areas and an earthquake fault awareness overlay have been created.

Where there is no adequate data, Council err on the side of caution and always seek to mitigate potential risk. While climate change is not mentioned specifically as a natural hazard climate change projections are included in the relevant modelling and therefore the rules and standards address its potential impact.

The best way to see locations at risk is through the ePlan. There are multiple map overlays that specifically cover the identified natural hazards, for example the coastal high hazard erosion area and coastal inundation area. The related rules and requirements are then easily accessed with the Property Specific Draft District Plan Chapters in the left column of the ePlan.

With river flooding and overland flow flooding (stormwater) our most common natural hazard threat, the Flood Assessment Area overlay shows land most at risk, including the urban areas with overland flow issues. If your property is within this assessment area it means the area is highly likely to be subject to flooding or inundation. The level of risk to people and property will require a site-specific assessment before an activity can be consented. A new feature of the plan is the requirement to acquire a Flood Risk Certificate for building or development in the Flood Assessment Area and the coastal inundation area.

Council has taken a risk-based approach to managing activity within the district's natural hazard areas. At all times Council's focus is on trying to mitigate risk to people and property. By avoiding development occurring in high-risk areas, we are aiming to protect future lives and properties.
